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### **Ander Gunn**

Since the 50's Ander Gunn has taken black and white photographs with an analogue camera and developed his own prints. He started in London photographing London scenes, actors and authors including his brother the poet Thom Gunn. He moved to Cornwall in the 60s, where he photographed many of the well-known artists living there at that time such as Wilhelmina Barns-Graham, Barbara Hepworth, Patrick Heron, Roger Hilton, Rose Hilton and Karl Weschke. Hehas lived in Cornwall on and off ever since, photographing miners, his family, artists, landscape and the sea.
